
### TREES, TREES AND OLD TREES


Between debris from recent storms and our PPP stewards pruning bay suckers, we accu-

mulated a ton of tree stuff. In late March, volunteers, guided by Preserve Manager Kaya Halpern, rented a chipper and shredded the debris, which we'll spread on the main path later. Other volunteers took advantage of the damp soil to weed grasses along the trails.

We hired Empire Tree to remove limbs overhanging the electrical lines at the Firehouse. They also trimmed redwood limbs encroaching on neighbors' yards along the edge of the Preserve.

Mike Jones, a Forestry Advisor from UC Cooperative Extension, provided onsite training to Restoration Committee members in April for evaluating the health of the Preserve's redwoods. Walking the Preserve, he noted PPP's alluvial (flood plain) habitat was unusual, as redwoods usually grow in colluvial soil (rocks, sand and soil at the base of a slope).





Mike will return to tag each of the trees, measure their diameter

(at 54" above ground) and record base-line data. The Committee will then monitor tree health over time. Mike took a core sample of one of our redwoods and discovered that it was between 500-600 years old!

### THE SHIREY HOUSE - 21956 RUSSIAN RIVER AVENUE

The large blue house at the end of Russian River Avenue (at Willow Way) was built in 1912 in the California Craftsman style popular during the early 20th Century. It was built and occu-

pied by the Andersons in 1912 after first constructing a little cabin. A small garage in front of the cabin was added in the 20s or 30s.

Marie Torvik Gelan (1887-1973), who was born in Norway, and her husband Charles (1874-1958) purchased the home in the 1920s for their vacation home. They lived in Berkeley where Charles was a caterer for large events. In the '30s, they enclosed part of the back

porch, turning it into a kitchen and the old kitchen became the dining room.

When Charles died, Marie continued to live in the house alone until she passed away at the age of 85. Her niece, Marjorie Thorvick Shirey (Paul's mother), inherited the house at this time. As a child, Marjorie had visited her aunt in Villa Grande in 1930 while on a vacation, traveling from Minnesota. After she

inherited the house, Marjorie rented it out until the 1980s after which it was used exclusively by family.

Marjorie's other son, Mark, with his partner Jeffrey, lived in the

house for a couple of years in the early 1990s. Mark was an engineer and a minister, and established the Ecumenical Catholic Church of Villa Grande, holding Sunday services in the little cabin. The congregation was non-exclusive, but catered primarily to gay people. Jeffrey also was known for reaching out and helping people in need in the area. In 1993, Jeffrey died of AIDS while they were living in

Monte Rio; Mark left the Russian River area soon afterward and passed away in 2014.

The house then went to Marjorie's husband Kenneth in 2006, and later to their son Paul. With his wife, Myra Radlow, Paul is restoring the yard to how it appeared in the 1960s. Their daughter is looking forward to being the fourth generation taking care of the house!

### WINTER(S) OF OUR DISCONTENT

### THE MOSCOW ROAD CONTINUING SAGA

The past four years have been tough on Moscow road, with a pavement washout and mudslide in 2019, a downed tree last year and the latest, on January 8, a fallen tree-pavement washout combo on the way to Monte Rio. Repair of the 2019 washout near Casini Ranch has been stalled as the County

waited for FEMA to make good on promised support. Then, with funds secured, permits and permissions in place, the contract was ready for bidding when the second washout happened. Not only did it take out 55' of roadway (photo), reducing access to Villa Grande to one lane, but it broke the 8" water main running under the pavement. Sweetwater Springs has installed 2" lines to continue supplying Villa Grande, the Terraces and Freezeout Road until their repairs are complete, promised for June.

With both roads to Villa Grande re-

duced to one lane, Johannes Hoevertsz, Director of the County Department of Public Infrastructure and our 5th District Supervisor, Lynda Hopkins, recognized the urgency. At a MAC meeting in February and later at the FoVG-sponsored community meeting on March 4th in Monte Rio, they presented a plan for combining the two projects which would be funded with a loan

from another County account, while waiting for FEMA reimbursement. The loan required approval of at least 4 of the 5 the Supervisors, so a letter writing campaign was mounted by community members - supported by FoVG and Friends of Monte Rio - to make the case. Sukey Robb-Wilder arranged for

articles in the Press Democrat, which included a front-pager with photos on March 1. The impact of hundreds of emails and letters was acknowledged by several Supervisors at their meeting on March 14, and the unique funding process was adopted unanimously by the them while yet another atmospheric river raged out-

Johannes' team is now well into the design and bidding process for repairing both road failures. At the FoVG town hall on June 24, we will

get an update on the project.

For helping things move forward, and especially the letter writing mobilization, thanks to Andrea Buffa, Kyla Brooke, Anna Cabrera, Ruben Garcia, Nick and Patty Thayer, Sukey and Natalie Robb-Wilder plus many others, and of course all who wrote to the Supervisors urging action. We also owe a debt of gratitude to Press Democrat Senior Reporter Martin Espinoza for taking up our cause.

### **BOAT ANCHORAGE AVAILABLE**



Yes, it's time to reserve a spot for your boat on the FoVG-sponsored anchorage chain on the gravel beach. The storms have carved a cliff to the beach, so leaving your craft down there for the whole summer is even more attractive. Current members are eligible to request one slot per household, until they're gone. A signed liability waiver is required as well as a label affixed to your boat. ### A NEW SIGN OF SPRING

FoVG recently received a communication from Leslye Choate, manager of the Sonoma County Environmental Health Program, informing us of their intent to place a new sign at the entrance to the Preserve, next to the algae sign. This sign gives advice on safe consumption levels of fish taken from the Russian River.

Neighbors have expressed concerns about more signage at the 3rd Street entrance and have suggested alternatives such as educational brochures. Leslye says there is a public health concern over mercury and PCB levels in the local fish, and that the sign is required by the State. Similar signs will be posted at Lake Sonoma, Laguna De Santa Rosa, San Pablo Bay and throughout the state.

A perennial herb often used in restoration projects for erosion control, mugwort also has medicinal and ceremonial uses. Mugwort tea can induce vivid dreams. It is native in the western United States, with small white flowers, and can spread by seeds or more commonly by rhizomes. The seeds are popular with birds and the plant hosts some butterflies. It's species name honors David Douglas, for whom the Douglas fir is named.
